

DUBLINERS. By J. Joyce. Crown Bvo, cloth. 3s. 6d. net (24th Nov.)

A book of studies of Dublin life, which, although detached, is by no means a mere collection of sketches, but has a very distinct unity. Never before has this side of Dublin life been presented in quite so real a manner. The author's style at once removes the book from the no doubt ordinary and makes it the piece of literature that will be read with the same recognition from discerning critics as did his book of a few years ago, of which Mr. Arthur Symonds wrote so sagaciously good, so fine and delicate, and yet so full of meaning and suggestion, that I can hardly choose among them to do more than suggest that they are worth reading. The work is not only roses in the garden, but the very dew on the roses. Sometimes we are reminded of Elizabethan, more often of Jacobean lyrics.

LABOUR IN IRISH HISTORY. By Jas. Connolly. 2s. 6d. net

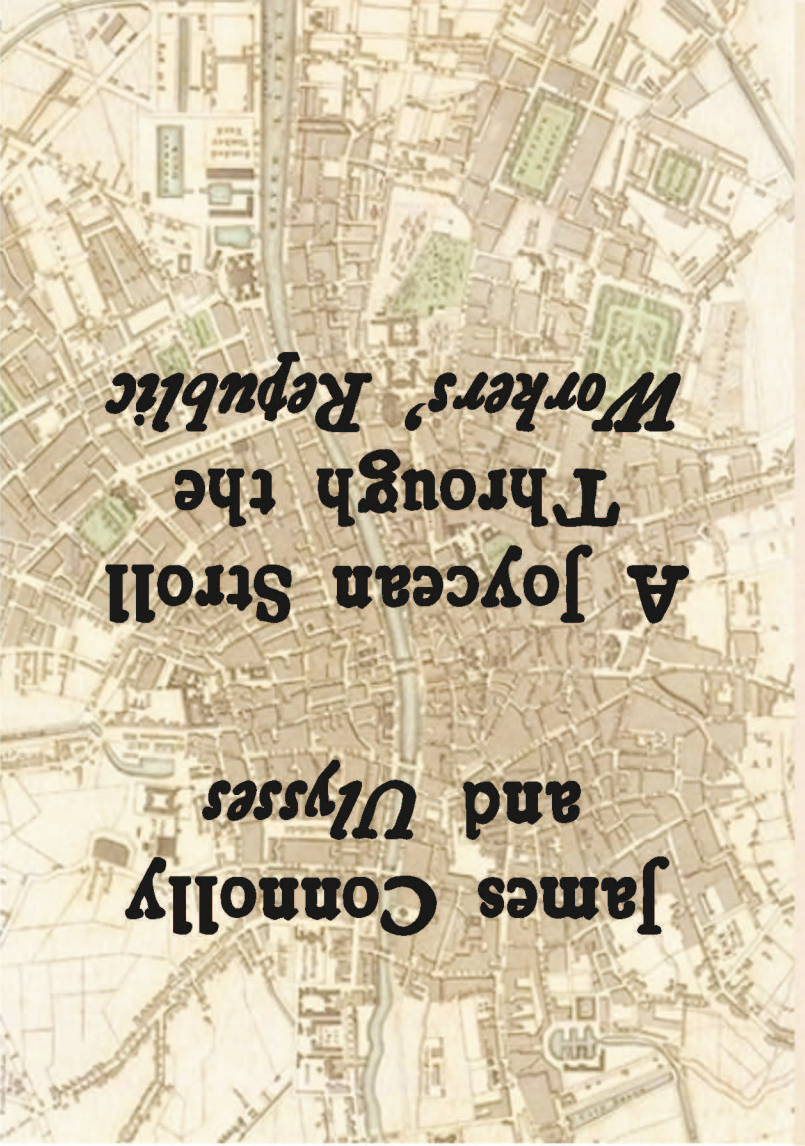
This work by Mr. James Connolly, the well-known Irish Labour Leader, will be invaluable for those who desire to gain a knowledge as to the relations between the great political movements of the past in Ireland, and the hopes and struggles of the toiling masses. Beginning with a careful résumé of the effects of the rupture of Celtic traditions, laws, and language, it deals with the social and political conditions, various phases of the Irish National struggle for the past two centuries, and the part which the labour question played in these historical episodes. The work will form an indispensable handbook for all engaged in democratic propaganda in Ireland.

THE DAY'S BURDEN. By T. M. Kettle, M.P. Foolscap 8vo. 2s. 6d. net (20th Nov.)

This volume contains a revised version of Mr. Kettle's well known *Philosophy of Politics*, and introduction to *Contemporary Ireland*, with an Essay on Anarchic France, some excellent foreshadowing on *Hamlet*, and a series of "Reveries." Specially notable is the Economic Study bearing the title of "Otto Effertz," an examination is given of Proudhon's Socialism. Altogether the book is a book of the most varied appeal, full of epigram and eloquence, though with a somber undertone. As for the general scope of his ideas the author writes in his apology: "My only programme for Ireland consists, in equal parts, of Home Rule and the Ten Commandments. My only counsel to Ireland is that in order to become deeply Irish she must become European."

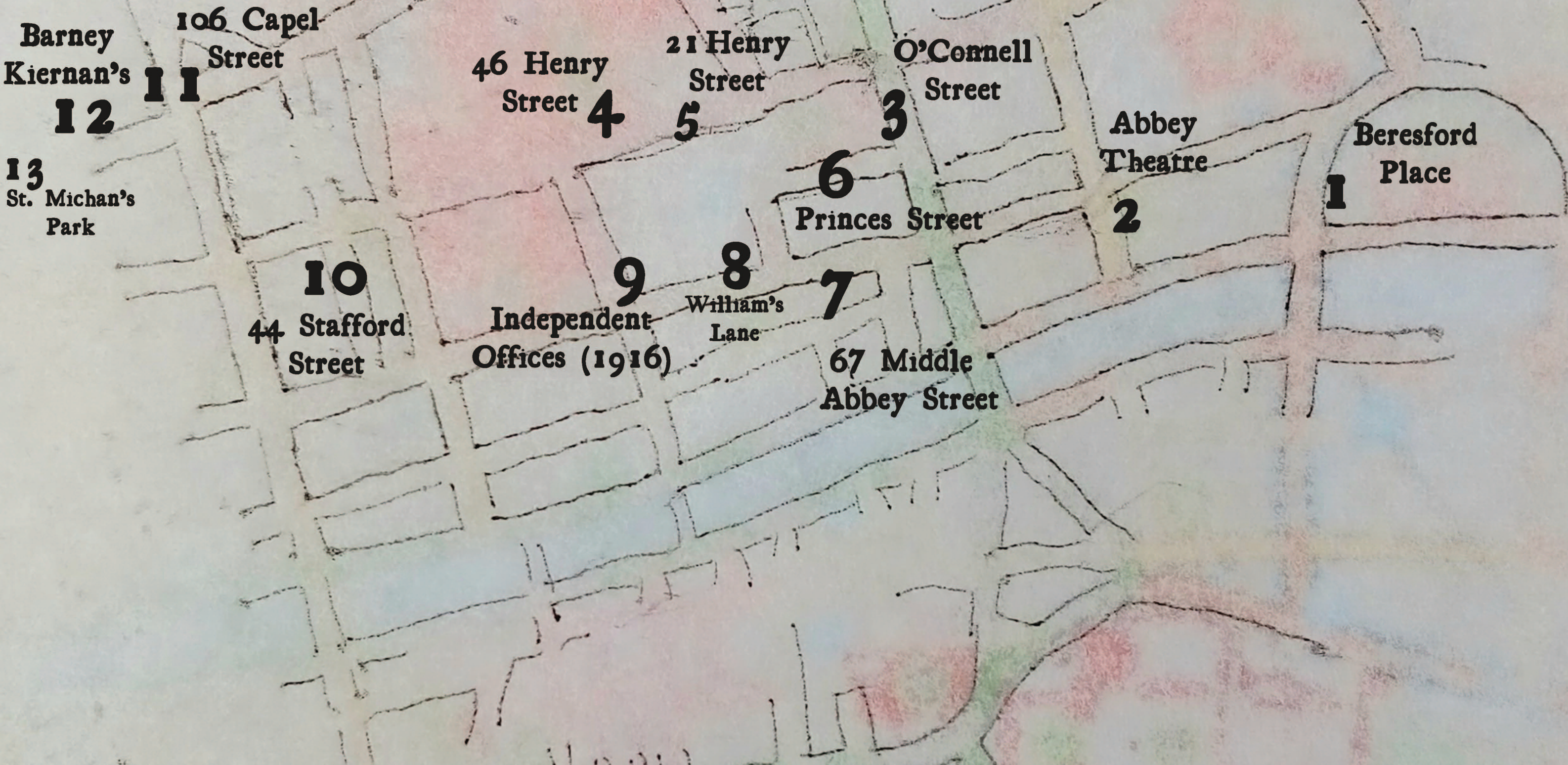
